Deciding What to Apply For

Many shows have themes so look at your work to see if you have one or more pieces that will fit the theme.

Some shows are 'open' so any work can be submitted.

Look at work selected for prior shows.

Be sure to check <u>all</u> deadlines

Making the Application

Read all instructions <u>carefully</u>.

Every show/site has different requirements, including:

- 1) How to size your photos
- 2) How to pay PayPal accounts are easy
- 3) How many you can submit

Now what?

When you have work accepted to a show, you should receive detailed instructions on how to get your work where it needs to go.

I have always used FedEx. With an account, you can easily include a return label to have your work returned if it does not sell.

Price the piece if that was not done when submitted.

Be sure your work has a label on the back showing your name, contact information, and anything else the gallery requires.

Galleries expect photos to be matted and framed. Some will state a requirement for framing. You are always safe with a white mat and black frame!

If shipping, use plexiglass instead of glass. Some galleries require that.
