Bear with me a bit...

The photo theme for April was Decay. Ten members submitted 30 photos for the presentation. The photos depicted decay as a process - one with a beginning, a middle, and an end. Several photos were suggestive of decay about to happen (such as the Last Stand by Robert Hamre). A second group showed the process of decay (consider All We Are is Dust in the Wind by Seth Madell). And a third group revealed items that had already decayed (such as The Wheel by EJ Choi).

Next month's theme is

Shallow Depth of Field. Members should submit up to three images using the theme as your guide. Send them to Kristi Dixon at themes@daphotoclub. org. Each photo should be in JPG format, and its file size should not exceed 2MB. Dimensions should be no larger than 1920 pixels wide and 1080 pixels tall.

What is Light Painting?

You have been seeing this term show up for the last several months in the DAPC programs. Dale gave a short introduction, Colleen Gino will give a full program May 1st and Victor will do some light painting on the May 12th photo field trip.

Light painting is simply using a light source to add light to an under-illuminated subject while taking a long-exposure photograph. Light painting is similar to low light photography except the light is usually in motion. To keep yourself invisible, make sure the light source is aimed at the subject, and that you do not light up yourself. Dark clothing helps. Also, keep moving during the whole exposure. Don't stand in one place for more than a couple of seconds or you will show up as a ghost in that spot. But if you keep moving and keep your light moving, you will not show up in the photo.

Ron Wolfe, a past president of DAPC, would put a piece of colored cellophane over the flashlight and it would turn lighted areas red or yellow or blue. Another way to light up your subject is to put the light inside or behind the building structure so the light shines out of the windows.

Colleen Gino uses a swinging light source to create light shapes within the photos. For example, you can write your name or date in lights in a photo, or create exploding fireworks or reflections that are not really there. Salvador Dali was one of the first to use light painting as we know it when

he wrote his name into a photo with a flashlight. Light painting adds an exciting, artistic effect to a real life subject in very low light. Check these links for more info/examples or check you tube for light painting photography tutorials: Here, here and here.

Call to Artists Eye of the Camera

The International Eye of the Camera, an exhibit for photographers now in its seventh year, is once again coming to El Paso's International Museum of Art this July and organizers want you to participate. El Paso Art Association (EPAA) Director Karla Zanelli has made some changes in this year's entry process, designed to encourage photographers from throughout the region to enter.

"Doña Ana Photography Club shooters have done well in the show over the years, so we are hoping to get even more participation from the club this year," Zanelli said. "It's a good time to start thinking about the show, with the deadline coming up June 24," she said.

The show won't be juried this year and entry fees are being reduced. Submit your best work, whether a beginner or advanced photographer. The EPAA will still be giving cash prizes and typically other sponsors also award prizes in the contest. Noted El Paso photographer and graphic artist Manuel Rosas will judge this year's entries

for the awards. A plus for the International Eye of the Camera exhibit is the venue. The International Museum of Art, 1211 Montana Avenue, is one of the finest exhibit spaces in the city.

"It's a thrill to have your work shown in the museum," said Will Keener, DAPC Member who won two awards in last year's show. "It's a well-lit, spacious environment for the photos." The show also brings together some of the better regional photographers, he said. "It's a good place to see what others are working on."

This year's exhibit will run from the opening, July 8, through August 1. Details on entry requirements for the 2018 show are available on the EPAA website, elpasoartassociation.com.

Purchase Prize Show

The Grant County Art Guild's 33rd Annual Purchase Prize Show dates and some new specifications have been announced. This show is legendary and the \$1500 Best of Show purchase prize and other generous cash awards draws in artists from across the state of New Mexico. The show will open with a gala reception on September 25 and will also be available for viewing and for purchases September 28 to 30 and again on October 5 to 8. Entry forms are due with a postmark date of no later than August 2. The entry forms as well as complete information are available online at www.gcag.org.

In keeping with the western theme, this year's show is titled "The Enduring West". We ask those considering entering the Purchase Prize Show to please note that after all these years – some changes have been made in the requirements and scope of the show. The show is now open to and has its own category for photography. And also, the minimum age limit of 18 has been removed. The Guild would love to see some young artists competing! Also, for the purpose of jurying, digital images of work entered, as well as printed images are accepted. Framing guidelines have been relaxed and canvas wraps are acceptable.
